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25th Anniversary of the Bibbulmun Track





4 Howe Court, Walpole Huge Price Reduction!

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On Tuesday 29th August, the community gathered at the Walpole Hotel-Motel to celebrate the 25th anniversary of the opening of the Bibbulmun Track. As the Southern Terminus from 1989 to 1998, Walpole has always held a special connection to the track, with the Walpole Workcamp even being established to work on the track – work that continues to this day!

A bit of background on the Track: On 13th September 1998 the new Bibbulmun Track was officially opened in Albany. The Track had been significantly realigned, extended from Walpole to Albany and upgraded with the addition of timber shelters at the campsites.

An official function was held at the Bibbulmun Track Southern Terminus to open the Track and farewell a group of walkers, 11 of whom completed the first end-to-end. Along the way, they were accompanied by sectional walkers. The event was called Bib Walk '98.

In 2008, the 10th Anniversary was celebrated by an end-to-end walk starting in Albany. continued page 2...

Even though the official celebration is 13th September, the Walpole Hotel Motel was packed with people eager for some good food and a cold drink. especially for those walking the track.

Steve Sertis, Event Manager for the Bibbulmun Track Foundation served as the lead guide for the walk.

Upon arriving at the pub, the *Weekly* caught up with Steve for a quick chat and he expressed how pleased he was with the event; citing the large number of community members who arrived to show their support and of course, the incredible food provided by the proprietors Kris and Nate, which, I understand, was made entirely from local produce. Despite the damp weather and grey skies that have become familiar to us all over recent weeks, the sun was shining, and the walk went smoothly with no one getting wet, although there were a few faceplants!

Entering the pub, we were greeted with songs from the wonderful Rob V of Dig the Dust fame provided the room with an ambience that made it easy for people to chat. Huge thanks are owed to Jenny Willcox, Dave Tapley and Robyn Christian for their incredible work organising the event, it couldn't have gone better!

I think Jenny Willcox accurately expressed why the event was organised in her speech:

"Today, we gather here to celebrate a milestone that encapsulates the very essence of our deep connection with the land and the spirit of adventure that resides within each one of us. As we stand before the 25th anniversary of the Bibbulmun Track, we are

reminded of the remarkable journey that this trail has undertaken, shaping lives, fostering camaraderie, and etching stories of resilience and exploration onto the canvas of Western Australia's natural beauty.

As we take this moment to reflect on the journey that has brought us here, I am reminded of the vital role that the town of Walpole played in the inception and evolution of this iconic trail. Walpole, one of the nine towns that proudly cradles the Bibbulmun Track, holds a special place in the heart of this trail's history. It was here, in the year 1998, that the concept of the Bibbulmun Track was given life. The same year witnessed the establishment of the Walpole Prison Work Camp, a significant endeavour that would provide the workforce essential to erect the walkers' huts and bridges, and to extend the track's course as it reached towards Albany.

The journey has not been without challenges, for forging a path through rugged terrain and untamed wilderness demands both determination and vision. However, it was with a collective spirit that the Walpole Community Resource Centre stepped forward, becoming the first registered "Friend of the Bibbulmun Track". The commitment and drive that flowed from this community served as the guiding light that led us through the darkest of forests and the steepest of ascents.

As we stand here today, the Bibbulmun Track stands not merely as a trail, but as a symbol of our unity with nature and our shared pursuit of the uncharted. Its corridors have echoed with laughter, stories, and the footsteps of countless adventurers, each contributing to its legacy, each leaving their mark on its path. Through sunlit days and moonlit nights, the Bibbulmun Track has been our canvas of discovery, inviting us to uncover the untouched corners of our world and to rediscover our own strengths."

Before I end this article, it would be remiss of me if I failed to thank Kris and Nate of Walpole Hotel-Motel in not only hosting the event but showcasing such an array of local produce for the spread of food. It was delicious guys, thanks!

Women's Health Forum



As part of the Wellness in the Wilderness programme that has been running this year, a Health Forum for women was held at the CRC on 31st August, facilitated by Myrna from Silver Chain.

There were discussions about maintaining mental health as we age which, of course, has a bearing on our physical health - exercise, eating and sleeping well, reducing alcohol consumption and staying connected with others and within the community. We touched a little on menopause and the various health checks available to women through Silver Chain.

We were shown slides from a great website - <u>jeanhailes.org.au</u> - which provided information and discussion prompts with regard to maintaining good physical and mental health. The website has a vast number of resources including fact sheets, check lists, pod casts and information on natural therapies.

Myrna advised that it is important to have regular health checks with a GP as a tool for early detection of health problems.

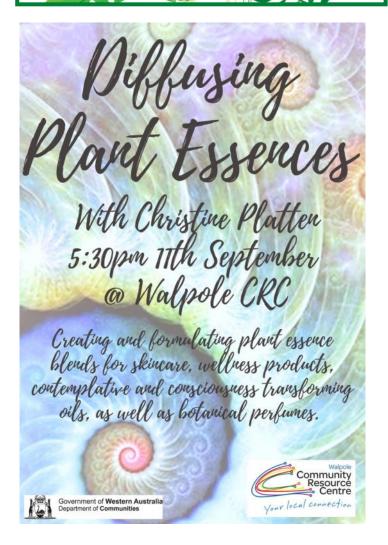
Following the presentation (and over morning teathanks Myrna!) Myrna offered blood sugar and blood pressure checks.

NB: Jean Hailes for Women's Health is a national not-for-profit organisation committed to improving women's knowledge and understanding of complex health issues.

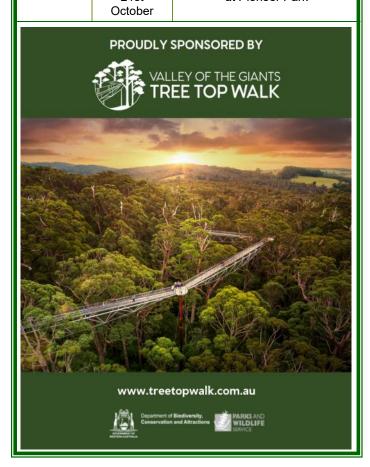

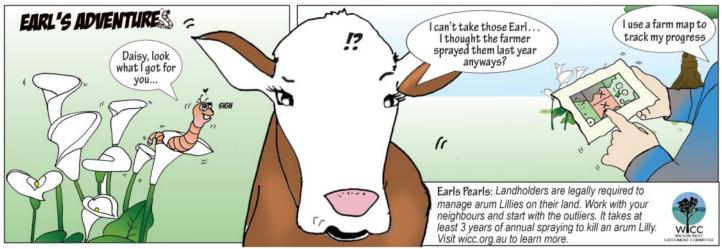

Controlling arum lily



The Owingup Kent Grower Group (OKGG) met recently at the Kentdale Hall to explore options to control arum lily (Zantedeschia aethiopica). Another South

escapee, arum lillies thrive in wet areas and if left unmanaged will quickly form a monoculture outcompeting native plants. Declared as a pest species on the West Australian Organisms List, landholders are legally required to control arum lillies under the Biosecurity and Agriculture Management Act 2007. Arum lillies are toxic to stock and deaths have occurred in WA.

Carl Dusenberg, from Dusenberg Land Garden and Environment Services, informed the OKGG that arum lily thrives in Southwest WA because we lack the checks and balances that mitigates their proliferation in their native South Africa. Lillies are often spread by birds and to a lesser degree waterways. Carl said that arum lily can be controlled manually or chemically. Manual control can be carried out at any time of the year. You must ensure that you dig out the entire tuber and dispose of it, preferably by burning.

Chemical control is best carried out from July to November. Carl recommends to use the Bradley Method, focussing on the outliers in your infestation first and then working towards the main infestation.

This will help keep your unaffected areas arum lily free. It is also handy to make a map of your property so you can record your infestation and control efforts as it can be difficult to remember what you sprayed the year before. It take a few years for chemical control to take out an arum lily as it will reshoot from its tuber in year two. Landholders sometimes give up in year two because they think the chemicals did not work. If sprayed again in year two you will notice the benefits in the third year. Work with your neighbours to have the greatest impact. Be persistent and you will best the arum lily beast.

Metsulphuron with an added surfactant such as Pulse is the most efficient chemical control. If you don't use a surfactant you are wasting your time and chemicals. As always, when using surfactants, keep them out of our waterways and listen out for frogs before applying. Surfactants act as a vector for any accompanying herbicides to poison our frogs as the surfactant allows the chemical to go through their permeable skins. Some landholders have found it handy to use dye or paint to mark which lillies have been sprayed to ensure they hit everything.

Getting into the driver's seat - It's our health



Empowering men to take responsibility for their wellbeing and health, that's our core focus here at The Regional Men's Health Initiative. We do this in light of the adverse statistics that represent men's health in general and the notion that for a large proportion of men, developing their health knowledge is not seen as a priority. This fits with men having a more functional view of their health, i.e. not seeking help until we are virtually physically impaired by the problem. We often challenge men on these points but what does it really mean as a bloke to take responsibility for his own wellbeing and health?

As blokes we take responsibility and make a lot of informed decisions throughout our lives, on a variety of things such as family, work and social issues. Why then should decisions about our wellbeing and health be any different?

Too many blokes are running into trouble because we keep avoiding and putting off looking after our wellbeing and health. Just being a passive participant is not good enough, we need to be the one in the driver's seat in all areas of our health, be it physical, mental or social/spiritual.

Taking responsibility for our wellbeing and health means becoming an active and informed healthcare consumer. It means scheduling regular service visits with our doctor and being aware of issues that affect us at certain stages of our lives, such as the potential for prostate problems as we get older. We also need to consider issues that could be common in our families (hereditary) and discuss these with the doctor. It's a bit of a generalisation but how many of us guys rely on our wives or partners for our health when it comes to our diet, i.e. what food is in the house and what we eat for dinner?

Remember that it's not our wife's, mate's or doctor's wellbeing and health, it's ours. Good wellbeing and health can only happen if and when we, as blokes, take responsibility!

While taking charge is important it doesn't mean we have to go it alone, we all need help sometimes. From a community educator and support worker perspective, this often means our role involves walking beside someone helping to establish relevant pathways of support. It could also be simply listening to and validating people's issues and accompanying emotions. We see it as walking beside the ute with the window down but not hopping in, it's your ride, you are the one in the driver's seat!

Our key message ... before it at all gets too much... Talk to a Mate®!! requires us to take some responsibility in that it's important we identify who our mates are so that when things get really bad (and it does happen) we have a plan in place to address things.

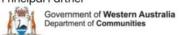

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Bushfire Preparedness



Bushfire season is fast approaching, now is the time for our communities to prepare themselves and their homes. You can help inspire community members to take action, by educating them about their bushfire risk and arming them with information about how to prepare.

Firefighters will be too busy fighting fires on the frontline to defend your home and property, so it is your responsibility to be prepared. <u>Download, print and complete the Property Preparation Checklist</u> to give your home and property the best possible chance of surviving a bushfire.

Prepare your home for bushfires

A handy checklist on how to prepare your home for bushfires. Post this image (see attached Bushfire Property Preparation Graphic) early in the bushfire season, when hot weather is forecast and/or the Fire Danger Rating is elevated, to give your community practical steps to minimise risk around their home.

Four simple steps

 Create your bushfire plan, prepare your property, pack an emergency kit and make sure you understand the Bushfire Warning and Rating Systems.

Prepare your property. Simple and ongoing monthly property upkeep includes:

- Cut the grass around your property to 10cm or less, prune shrubs so they are not dense
- Clean gutters
- Check gas release valves face away from property

More lasting actions to prepare your property include:

- Create a minimum two metre gap between your house and tree branches
- Install metal flywire mesh on all windows and vents and install a protective screen on evaporative air conditioners.
- Block any gaps under the floor, in roof spaces, under eaves, external vents, skylights, chimneys and wall claddings.
- Install a fire or heat radiant shield such as a solid fence

Your councillors and Shire President are elected by the community via the Local Government Elections.

Elections are held every two years on the third Saturday of October. Councillors serve a four year term, thus at each ordinary election, approximately half of the eight positions are up for election.

In 2023, State Government reforms to the local government sector required the review of ward and councillor numbers across local governments in Western Australia. As a result, the Shire of Manjimup has been ordered to reduce it Wards from six (Coastal, North, South, Central, West and East) to two (Urban and Rural) and the number of Councillors reduced from eleven to eight plus a Shire President.

Each Councillor is elected to represent a ward in the local government district. For the purposes of the 2023 Election, and ongoing, the Shire of Manjimup will be divided into two wards, Urban Ward and Rural Ward, with four councillors in each ward, plus a Shire President. This meets the requirement for each Councillor to represent plus or minus 10% of the population.

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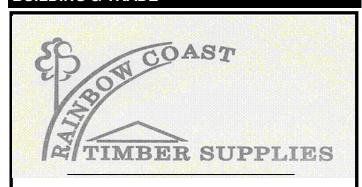

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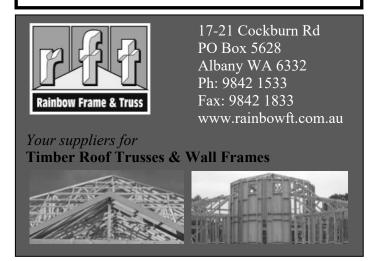

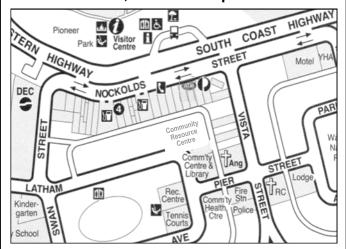

Bush Fire Brigades Local Law 2023

At the meeting held on 17 August Council adopted the Bush Fire Brigades Local Law 2023. The adoption of the new Bushfire Brigades Local Law will ensure that Shire Officers have adequate statutory authority to ensure the good governance of bushfire brigades within the district. The law will now be sent to the Department of Premier and Cabinet for Gazettal.

Dual naming of Frankland River

Council recently supported a request from the Shire of Denmark for the dual naming of the Frankland River to Kwakoorillup/ Frankland River. This was the name of the river as originally recorded by WN Clark in 1842, albeit that he spelt it with a "Qu" rather than a "Kw" and means "place of the Quokka" in Noongar.

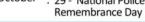
