Nature Notes: Nornalup or Walpole Frog



This is a small forest frog, about 2.5cm long which is not very big. Its scientific name is *Anstisia lutea*. It is a brown-grey colour on top with a pale cream to yellowish underside with brown specks.

The male has a black throat. The eyes are yellow and black. Its fingers and toes are unwebbed and it lacks pads on the toes and fingers.


The calls are a series of distinctive clicks. This starts in July and continues to December with the peak being around September-October. This frog is totally unique to the Walpole Nornalup National Park.

Like many terrestrial frogs it lives in dense bush and has tunnels under mud and vegetation. The tadpoles never swim but develop into froglets in the nest where they exist in the broken egg jelly feeding on their own reserves of yolk. They reach a size of 1.5cm before developing into froglets. The tadpoles are brown with metallic blue specks. Their development takes one and a half months. These frogs were originally classed in the genus *Geocrinia* however recent research has placed it in a new genus *Anstisia* along with three other closely related species. This genus was named in honour of Dr Marion Anstis an Australian Museum Research Associate.

This frog is obviously threatened by global warming and loss of habitat. However it is considered by the International Union for the Conservation of Nature to be of least concern. It is fortunate that the Walpole Frog lives in a national park as are all rare frogs in the southwest of WA. The area in which it lives is not very widespread and because of their restricted range they are all seen as being at risk.

Albanese and Cook governments deliver more fee-free training



The Albanese and Cook Governments will continue their partnership to deliver Fee-Free TAFE and vocational education and training (VET) places to Western Australians over the next three years.

Under the joint partnership, a further 22,200 Fee-Free TAFE and VET places will be available for Western Australians from January 2024.

In 2024, the WA Government will fund additional places to keep pace with demand, which has seen Fee-Free enrolments across VET soar to more than 34,000 this year.

This injection of Fee-Free training places builds on the success of the initiative throughout 2023, and will continue to provide cost of living support for Western Australians choosing to study in priority areas.

It continues the genuine collaboration and partnership between the Commonwealth and WA Governments to plug the skills gap and provide training opportunities for all Australians.

Fee-Free places target areas of skills shortage such as early childhood education and care, health care, aged and disability care, technology and digital skills, hospitality and tourism, construction, agriculture, VET workforce, and the defence industry.

This year saw a strong take up of Fee-Free places, with qualifications in early childhood education and care, aged and disability care. Nursing, along with information technology, and hospitality have the strongest enrolments, adding much-needed skills for

these priority industries.

In 2023, Fee-Free training is available across 130 courses, including a range of qualifications and skillsets with all Western Australians eligible to access the programme at WA TAFE colleges and training providers.

Getting a good night's sleep



There are times in business when it's all go, whether it's on the farm during seeding and harvest or meeting deadlines at work. It may mean working longer than normal hours and possibly becoming sleep deprived. A lack of sleep not only reduces our ability to perform work effectively, it also reduces our ability to work safely. Some have regarded sleep as a useless waste of time with no purpose - NOT TRUE. Science and medicine are discovering more and more about the role of sleep and its influence on our wellbeing and health.

How much sleep do we really need?

- Infants and toddlers 9 to 10 hours at night plus day naps;
- School age including teenagers do best with 9 to 11 hours at night;
- Most adults 7 to 8 hours a night;
- Older adults need the same as younger adults but sleep lighter and for shorter periods.

Some people just need fewer hours of six or less a night without ill effects. The need for less or even more sleep can run in families (suggesting a genetic basis but it is incredibly rare).

What are the effects of lack of sleep? While we're sleeping, our body is busy tending to our physical and mental health and getting us ready for another day. Lack of sleep can lead to:

- Drowsiness and irritability during the day;
- Poor concentration hindering memory and our ability to pay attention;
- Poor physical coordination increasing the risk of accidents;
- High blood pressure which is one of the main risk factors for heart disease;
- Depression.

Regularly sleeping less than 5 hours is associated with poor physical and mental health and wellbeing.

Sleep may be more difficult to come by as we age, and this can be traced to treatable health issues that cause interrupted sleep. Some factors that could cause sleep difficulties:

- Sleep disorders like sleep-apnoea, restless leg/arm syndrome, leg cramps;
- Pain from conditions like arthritis, heartburn, back pain, headaches;
- A frequent need to urinate;
- Illness depression, coughing, shortness of breath;
- Medications.

Some helpful tips for getting a good night's sleep are:

- Go to bed and get up at the same time each day, this synchronizes our body clock;
- Aim for daily exercise before evenings;
- Relax before bed i.e. warm shower, reading and avoid caffeine, nicotine and alcohol;
- Establish your pre-sleep routine (usually 3 things);
- Use bedroom/bed only for sleeping or intimacy not as a lounge room for watching TV.

Generally, if we can't sleep, we shouldn't lie in bed. Leave the bedroom and do a quiet activity that doesn't stimulate us. To help maintain a healthy lifestyle we all need to contemplate what is an adequate amount of sleep for us personally and visit our GP for treatment if we are amassing a huge sleep debt.
