

Vale William John (Bill) Armstrong 24-09-1933 to 26-11-2023



The funeral of the late Mr Bill Armstrong was held on 12th November at the Walpole Community Centre. Some 200+ people were in attendance to celebrate his life.

Bill's parents were original group settlers at Walpole in 1930. He was born at the family farm and lived in Walpole his entire life. He worked his farms until recent years when he sold the original farm.

Marrying later in life, Bill built a lovely home on his second farm for his wife Ann and himself. Over the years he supplemented his income with carpentry work and running a gravel and sand supply with his business partner, Thomas Gerner.

Bill was a huge contributor to the Walpole people, being involved with moving the Community Hall from the Shannon and relocating the lesser hall (now the library). He served on the hall committee for many, many years and had numerous active roles in the badminton and tennis clubs.

His recollections and story telling of the history and his experiences of Walpole in the old days were both informative and entertaining. He wrote a book about his Irish parents' migration to Australia and the history of their early years settling in Walpole.

He was loved and adored by all of his family and was well-respected in the community. Bill provided a great listening ear and some very sound advice to those he came in contact.

He will be sadly missed by his wife Ann, the family and many others.

First WOW Ecocruise back into the Wilderness!



It's been over two years since a partial landslide compromised the structural integrity of the staircase leading to Shelly Beach in the Nuyts Wilderness, forcing it's closure due to public safety concerns.

Shelly Beach is a significant attraction within the Nuyts Wilderness Area and important to the tourism

economy of the region. Prior to its closure, the staircase had been widely used by the visiting public and was the main destination on the WOW Wilderness Ecocruise run by Gary Muir.

Speaking to the Walpole Weekly, Gary said:

"It has been so exciting to get back to Shelly beach and into the Nuyts wilderness...due to damage received during La Niña, we lost the stairs.

"The Department of Biodiversity, Conservation and Attractions got the team together and its finally open!"

Just last week, works were completed to remove the old staircase and install a brand new one, which has been engineered to stabilise the slope using a 'surefoot' anchor system, with stainless steel frame and fibreglass reinforced mesh treads.

This new staircase complements the refurbishment works which were carried out to the adjoining jetty in 2019, meaning that the site will now offer safe access to Shelley Beach for many years to come.

Nornalup Jetty project update



Substantial progress has been made on the construction and installation of an all-abilities accessible jetty and paddlecraft launch at Nornalup.

The Shire of Denmark has received notification from project partner Department of Biodiversity, Conservation and Attractions (DBCA) that piling works are now complete and the floating platform is installed, but due to contractor delays the concrete boat ramp will be installed in January. This means, the existing boat launch ramp at Nornalup will remain closed to the public throughout the Christmas period, but the existing paddle access, nearby on Riverside Drive, remains accessible and boat users can launch from the Walpole town jetty.

Work will soon get underway to replace the aged timber structure at Monastery Landing, but the structure will remain in place over the holidays for public use.

The Shelly Beach staircase has been replaced and reopened, providing safe access from the Walpole/ Nornalup inlet to Shelly Beach.

This project is delivered in partnership with DBCA through the State Government Recovery Programme.

Pygmy Sperm Whale washed up on Circus Beach



On 20th September, a small whale carcass was discovered washed up on Circus Beach. It was an unusual specimen, and at 3.2m in length it was easy to assume that it was a newborn sperm whale, but as usual nature was full of surprises.

There were some school groups visiting at the time, and a few were lucky enough to be taken across for a look by Gary Muir. Measurements and photos were taken, and DBCA rangers took a sample of skin and blubber which was sent to the DBCA science lab in Kensington.

There were 2 possibilities in terms of species: a Dwarf Sperm Whale *Kogia sima*, or a Pygmy Sperm Whale *Kogia breviceps*. They are both dispersed widely across temperate and tropical oceans and have similar diets and habits but are rarely seen. Most of what we know comes from the analysis of beached specimens.

Genetic analysis is the best way to confirm the species, and the results from this specimen confirmed it to be the Pygmy Sperm! A rare find and another treasure thrown up on our beaches by the Southern Ocean.

Marine debris is reported to be a common threat to the species, which is another reminder for us to help keep our oceans clean and dispose of rubbish correctly.

Nature Notes: Earwigs



It may seem a funny topic to write about for nature notes but we have been seeing a lot of these around lately. A bit of research reveals that this order of

insects is quite interesting. The earwigs are in the order *Dermaptera*, with about 2,000 species world wide. They are found on all continents except Antarctica.

They are mostly nocturnal and like to hide in small damp crevices during the day. Their common name comes from the old English *wicga* meaning insect or beetle and the mistaken idea that earwigs crawled into the ear and laid eggs in the brains of humans!

There has been some instances of earwigs found in the ear, but science has disproved the myth they lay eggs in the human brain and despite their fierce appearance, due to an impressive pair of nippers on the back end, there is no evidence that they are harmful. In fact, like most insects they have an important balancing effect in the environment and a role in recycling debris and eating other insects such as wooly aphids.

Earwigs feed on a wide variety of insects and plants as well as scavenge. Damage to foliage and flowers and crops is often blamed on earwigs. Earwigs go through five molts before becoming adults. The female earwig shows maternal care towards the eggs and young which is extremely unusual in non-social insects. Males usually have curved nippers or pincers while in the females they are straighter. Most earwigs have wings under their front wing covers - these are quite small and earwigs are rarely seen in flight. Parasitic earwigs usually do not have wings.

There are about 60 types of earwigs in Australia. The

largest species known is *Titanolabis colossea* it is 50mm long and is found in Australia.

As indicated earwigs go through about five molts before becoming adults. The in-between molts are called instars. Earwigs live for about a year. They live in chambers of soil and debris. After mating the sperm will live in the female for quite a few months before the eggs are fertilised. From mid-winter to early spring the male will leave or be driven out by the female. The eggs are pearly white when laid but become darker and kidney shaped before they hatch.

The female will gather them together, protect them from predators and keeps them warm. She will not leave them even to eat. She also cleans them to prevent fungi growing on them. The eggs hatch after seven days. The mother may assist the young to hatch. When the young emerge they will eat the egg casing and continue to live with the mother. They look similar to the parents, just smaller. The young nest under their parent and she will continue to protect them until their second molt. The nymphs feed on food regurgitated by the mother.

The pincers or nippers are used for a variety of purposes: they play a part in mating and, along with the back part of the body, are used in holding prey and in defence These nippers are not dangerous to people.
