Update on fire conditions

The Walpole Weekly recently reached out to the Department of Biodiversity, Conservation and Attractions' (DBCA) Frankland District Manager Peter Masters for a discussion on the bushfire that has been burning in the region since Wednesday 24th April. When asked for an update on the efforts of the firefighting crew, Peter had this to say: DBCA is managing the bushfire with support still from volunteer bushfire brigades with around 70 DBCA and Bushfire Brigade volunteers still on the ground focusing on consolidating the 65 kilometre of edge. Some of the works currently underway include blacking out anything that is burning within 20 metres of the edge. We need to physically walk all public roads to check for anything that is dangerous that could impact our firefighters over the coming days and to ensure the roads will be safe to reopen for the public once its determined that it is safe to do so, which probably is a week away.

Once the fire ground is safe, DBCA local staff will assess the impacts of the bushfire. This process will assist in documenting and planning recovery actions, and potential actions are likely to include such things as post fire feral predator control, fencing of vulnerable populations of plants and animals that may be impacted by feral pigs, fire intensity mapping to identify areas that may be unburnt and identify areas for additional protection measures.

Over time, a picture of short and longer-term impacts will be built, which will help inform ongoing management of species and communities.

DBCA has already deployed sprinkler systems to wet down several areas of peat which are known to contain the rare sunset frog.

Aerial water bombers were used to actively combat the bushfire and support ground crews but aren't used to put water directly on peatlands as the pressure from the water leaving the water bomber aircraft (3,000 litres) may impact peatland environments, and the residue from wetting agents that are used to assist with supressing fires can be damaging to peat systems and the organisms that live in them.

The Middle Road Bushfire complex is well resourced with Frankland District staff providing an Incident Management Team in Walpole. We still have 20 trucks on the fire ground today, supported by 5 machines, water bombers are on standby in Manjimup, and several large water trucks and 22,000 litre portable water points, due to lack of usable water points in the area due to extremely dry conditions around the fireground..

No building were immediately impacted by the bushfire, due to the great effort of DBCA and DFES Bushfire Brigade volunteers, supported by water bombers and heavy bulldozers. There were small impacts on private property pastures.

We would like to thank all DBCA, DFES, Bushfire Brigade volunteers, Fire and Rescue Service firefighters and other support agencies including SES, Department of Communities, Walpole CRC for the assistance with the community meetings, Walpole Work Camp for assisting with water bombers and setting up evac centre, Walpole Sport and Recreation Centre and Main Roads WA. Everyone has done an amazing job to combat the fire

in difficult circumstance, and we received fantastic support from the Walpole, Nornalup and Denmark communities and businesses with exceptional community support, with provision of food supplies, and offers of accommodation at private residences and other assistance, in any way that they could assist.

The Walpole Weekly would like to thank Peter for taking the time to provide us with an update in the middle of a very stressful event. We would like to thank him and his team fighting the fire for keeping us safe.



Nature Notes: Grey Currawong



The Grey Currawong (Strepera Versicolour) has a latin name meaning variations in colour and until

recently the variations were thought to be separate species. They are a moderate sized bird very similar in appearance to a crow, however they have white beneath their tails and wings and their eyes are yellow.

Their beak is thicker and heavier than that of a crow. They are about 44-57cm long with a 72-85cm wing span. They are not usually confused with other birds but they can be confused with each other as there are six subspecies across Australia. Currawongs are related to magpies and butcher birds. They are seen around Walpole but not many have been seen this year although I think I saw some down by the Frankland river. These birds are less gregarious than magpies and they have not adapted well to urban development. However they are not considered to be at risk by the International Union for Conservation of Nature although within Australia some sub species are considered endangered. The West Australian sub species is called(Plumbea) and is sometimes called squeaker because of its call. In some parts of Australia they tend to be seen in winter and because we have had a dry season this might be the reason they have not been around.

Grey Currawongs are omnivores who are opportunistic feeders, eating berries and invertebrates lizards and small mammals. They are

known to snatch blue wren chicks. The birds mostly feed on the ground in small groups. In contrast to this they nest quite high in trees which makes them difficult to study. The breeding season is from August to December. Currawongs build a large, shallow nest of thin sticks lined with grass. The chicks are born naked and undeveloped, which seems to be the case with more intelligent birds. The eggs vary in size and colour according to sub species. The west Australian sub species lays redbrown or wine-coloured eggs with darker brown markings which culminates with one end of the egg being darker. Incubation takes about 23 days, although because of difficulties in observing the nest this is not really certain. Both parents feed and care for the chicks.

Grey currawongs in WA are found in dry jarrah forests, other forested areas and among paper barks in swampy area. They are also seen in the Wheat belt. They will visit deserted gardens in order to collect berries and may be seen prodding the ground for prey.

Group 116 settlers, who came from Devon & Cornwall, arrived in Albany in 1924 with great expectations of owning their own farm. They were lured by the "advertisement" that they would "own their own farm" when they came to "the land of milk & honey". Sir James Mitchells scheme was for them to establish dairy farming in the South West of WA, to supply cream to the goldfields. Full of hope they battled huge forests, hardship & isolation from their homeland & mounting debts.

Annual Vergeside Hard Waste Collection May 2024

The Shire of Manjimup provides a free annual hard waste collection service.

- ♦ This service is only available to domestic properties which have an existing regular kerbside rubbish bin collection service.
- ◆The service will collect:



- Refrigerators and freezers MUST have doors completely removed before being placed on the verge.
- ◆ The service will NOT collect:
- general domestic waste (food scraps etc)
- asbestos
- gas cylinders, other hazardous materials
- green waste (lawn clippings or tree limbs)
- ☑ liquid waste (oils, paints, chemicals etc)
- building materials (cement, bricks, rubble and renovation discards)
- crates, pallets, shopping trolleys
- vehicle tyres or vehicle batteries
- ▼ fluoro light tubes
- any type of battery
- Under the Shire of Manjimup Waste Local Law 2022:
 - hard waste material must not be put on the verge outside of the dates, volumes, dimensions or position specified here;
 - hard waste material placed on the verge must not be removed by a person for commercial gain but may be removed by a private person for a private purpose; and
 - no person may move, tamper with or disassemble any waste material placed on the verge in any way which may increase the risk of harm to any other person or affect the efficient removal of waste material by the Shire's contractor.

- Put your items out on your verge not more than one week before your town's collection start date.
- Do not put items out on or after the Monday start date for collection in your town as it may not be collected.
- Ensure your hard waste does not obstruct the footpath for pedestrians or lines of sight for drivers.
- Each household's waste items must be placed only on their own section of verge; households shall not add their waste to another property's verge area.
- ◆ A maximum of 3 cubic metres (1m x 1m x 3m) may be collected per property. Properties with more than this amount will have to make private arrangements to have their waste removed. Items longer than 2m will not be collected.





- 4. Present the results of the community consultation to Council, for Council to resolve through the Road Infrastructure Committee further action/s on the project by no later than September 2024.
