Massive MediSecure Cyberattack: Nearly 13 Million Australians' Medical Data Leaked



In April, MediSecure experienced a major cyberattack, resulting in the leak of personal medical data of nearly 13 million Australians. The attack is among the largest data breaches in Australian history, with 6.5 terabytes of data stolen. Unfortunately, the investigation couldn't pinpoint the affected individuals due to the data's complexity and cost constraints.

The stolen data includes:

- Personal details: Full name, title, date of birth, gender, email, address, phone number
- Healthcare identifiers: Medicare card numbers, Pensioner Concession card numbers, Commonwealth Seniors card numbers, Healthcare Concession card numbers, Department of Veterans' Affairs card numbers, and expiry dates for all cards
- Prescription details: Medication names, strength, quantity, repeats, and reasons for prescriptions

The affected data spans from March 2019 to November 2023. Since it's impossible to identify the exact individuals affected, it's recommended that all Australians take precautions. If you have ever received electronic prescriptions, you might be at risk.

What to Do:

- Be wary of unsolicited contacts, especially those referencing the MediSecure breach.
- Do not provide personal or payment information to unknown contacts.
- Verify the authenticity of any request by independently sourcing contact numbers.
- Concession card holders: No action needed as accounts can't be accessed with card numbers alone.
- Concerned about your Medicare card details? Replace your card via your Medicare online account through myGov.

Sirius and Jupiter:

As the sky brightens ahead of sunrise, the last two visible specks are the planet Jupiter, which is to the east of us, and the star Sirius, which is to the south. Up until an hour before sunrise (ie up until about 0600) Mars is also visible, higher than Jupiter and slightly to the north.

This data is from the automatic weather recording station at Walpole North, recorded on the BOM website.

Shire invests more than \$2.8m into local road network in 2024/25



Boosted funding for road infrastructure and civil works equipment in the newly adopted Annual Budget will allow the Shire of Denmark to continue strengthening its focus on local roads this financial year.

The 2024/25 budget for general roadworks maintenance across the Shire's 600km+ road network received a \$200,000 boost, with a total of \$1.6 million allocated.

It comes in addition to \$1,232,783 earmarked for specific capital works roads projects on Mt Shadforth, Parker, Tindale, Cussons and Wentworth roads, to be delivered in 2024/25.

The works team will also take delivery of some new equipment with funding from this year's budget, with a new wheeled excavator to enable more efficient delivery of the Shire's drainage maintenance program which will help to further improve road quality and safety.

Shire President Kingsley Gibson said the additional financial and equipment resources will contribute to ongoing improvements in service delivery across the roads network.

"We have a very large road network to maintain, and our hope is that with ongoing and meaningful investment, our community will start to see that cash paying off in improved infrastructure right across our Shire," Cr Gibson said.

"Local roads and stormwater drainage was the clearest community priority identified in the extensive engagement for our Strategic Community Plan, and this budget recommits us to working towards improvement in that area."

"In addition to increased budget funding, we're also trying to make it easier for our community to interact with us when it comes to finding out information about our roads program or reporting an issue."

"Our new website features an interactive map of our roads network which shares up-to-date grading information, and we have a new, simple and smartphone-compatible 'Report It' online form for community members to report issues and share feedback."

This year's focus on roads funding is not a one-off investment. The Corporate Business Plan 2024-2028 outlines future road projects to be funded and delivered in the coming financial years.

Shire of Manjimup believes it has a solution to the area's childcare woes



When parents Michela and Nick Blechynden went to enrol their son in child care before he was even born, they were told he may not receive a spot until he reached kindergarten age. The couple live in the South West town of Manjimup, 290 kilometres south of Perth, and said they'd had no problem enrolling their first child in 2020.

"When we had our first son Connor we were able to get him into childcare so I could work as a vet nurse three days a week," Mrs Blechynden said.

"But when I was ready to return to work after having Oliver, I was told there were only eight spots in the baby room and the waitlist was years long."

In a town of 9,000 people, Manjimup only has one childcare centre - YMCA Timber Tots Early Learning Centre which has 34 children waiting for placement.

The situation has forced some parents to either go without or travel to neighbouring towns Bridgetown or Pemberton for childcare.

Shire President Donelle Buegge said she was receiving multiple phone calls every week from desperate parents.

"I know this isn't normally a Local Government department, but this is an essential service that's holding back the progression of our economy," Cr Buegge said.

"A lot of these parents are professional people who can't go back to work due to lack of childcare and that's holding us up as a town."

The Shire held a community forum in July to address the long childcare wait times in town.

Those discussions identified the Lily Strauss Centre, a former kindergarten that closed around 10 years ago, as a potential site for a new childcare centre.

Not-for-profit group Activ owns the building but gifted it to the Shire.

"The main condition they had is that it would benefit

the community and what better way to do that than with a childcare centre," Cr Buegge said.

Childcare shortages are rampant across Western Australia, with a report finding regional WA ranks the worst in the state for childcare availability.

Neighbouring Shire of Augusta-Margaret River recently secured \$100,000 for a new childcare centre in Augusta.

The Great Southern is also struggling, with 200 applications for just 68 available spots in Albany.

The Productivity Commission recently found nearly half of all one-year-olds across Australia attended some sort of early childhood education.

The report also found removing childcare barriers could see an increase in labour supply equivalent to up to 118,000 full-time workers.

Timber Tots Early Learning Centre Director, Amanda Bennett, says having the Lily Strauss Centre as additional childcare in Manjimup will be a beneficial addition to the community.

"So the [YMCA] WA is very excited at the prospect of more childcare facilities being made available to Manjimup."

Compliance checks will soon begin at the Lily Strauss Centre to determine what it needs to operate as a childcare centre, but it has not yet been confirmed which operator will run the space.

In the meantime, the Blechynden family will be forced to continue living off one income.

"We just assumed Michela would be able to go back to work and everything would be all good," Mr Blechynden said.

"Businesses are screaming out for workers and there are capable people wanting to go back to work, but they don't have the ability to get the care for that to happen."

Although this little bug can't fly, the ease of it accidentally being transported makes it a threat to our avocado, citrus, nut, truffle and even blue gum industries. Please be vigilant, bringing garden materials, cuttings, even pallets into the South West have the potential to transport the little critters. Check out DPIRD website for more info.

I, along with fellow Councillors and the CEO were fortunate to attend the National Local Government Conference in Canberra recently. It was great to get the broader view of the challenges Local Governments across Australia are facing.
